There's blessing there for all of us And for our children too!


So when you hear our ringing

#### **Did You Know?**

The first recorded peal was rung at St Peter Mancroft Norwich on May 2<sup>nd</sup> 1715. The method was Plain Bob Triples.

Norwich was at the forefront of change ringing. Also rung in the same tower was the first peal of Grandsire Triples in 1718 and the first peal of Stedman Triples in 1731.

### Ringing Websites Review by Richard White

"next time you are browsing the net, take a look at Love's Guide to the church bells of the City of London" If I ever find myself in Central London with a little time to explore, rather than drag myself round the shops in the West End I like to explore the city. The square mile is full of history. If you look beyond the modern office blocks you can easily find gems of interest. I have always found Wrens churches fascinating. I often wonder how these churches survive in an area where thousands work but few live. These Wren masterpieces contain many fine rings of bells

including St Mary-le- Bow and St Lawrence Jewry. Next time you are browsing the net, take a look at Love's Guide to the church bells of The City of London. This site has been superbly created, with detailed histories of just about all the current rings of bells in the City and many that have been lost due to dereliction, redundancy or WWII bombing. One church that has fascinated me is St Dunstan in the East. Its striking spire is quite a

well known landmark. The church was badly bombed and the old bells were lost. The tower survived and was provided with a fantastic Taylor's octave. However, because the tower moved so much they were rarely rung. The bells were sold in the early seventies. You can listen to a rare recording of the bells on the web-site. There is also a very interesting account from John Pladdys of his time ringing at the tower.

At the beginning of November we held a committee meeting for Branch administration and activities. Above all, there was the need to discuss Steve Goddard's replacement as Ringing Master when he leaves in May. A few Branch members have been asked but. so far, we are without a willing volunteer. We do need a Ringing Master, so for those with the required skills please can you consider the role?

Another item was training courses. Last year I was fortunate

enough to join a **Banbury Branch Grandsire Doubles** course. It took place on a Saturday morning, at Tadmarton, and ran for about two hours: the tuition and individual support proved invaluable. As one of the objectives of the Guild is "the promotion of the art of change ringing", I'm hoping that our Branch might organise similar courses. However I need to establish whether there is sufficient demand and will circulate a questionnaire to all Branch tower

captains to coincide with the AGM in February. And finally... Combe now has a ringing simulator. Two bells have been wired up to a computer, which uses ABEL software and it has the capability to ring methods for up to 12 bells. The greatest benefit would be for those who are just starting to ring rounds and plain hunt. I plan to run sessions on Saturday mornings, which will be open to anyone in the Branch. Please contact me for details.
