This is a six bell tower with the tenor weighing 14cwt. Currently there is no band ringing these bells but this is not surprising as they do not ring that well as we found out. Lewknor bells have no guides and a very long draft, these two things do not go that well together at the best of times, but when the bells are springy as well it makes them incredibly hard to ring, and I mean hard! All you had to do was take one look at Lorna's face as she rang the treble up and you would know that they were difficult to ring. In my opinion I would choose never to ring these bells again and my mark out of ten will have to be 0. However on the bright side they were an experience. After what was described

as a very fun and interesting time we headed of to Watlington, St Leonard. To our relief these bells were a lot nicer than the first. They were a reasonably heavy ring of 8 as the tenor weighed 24-0-8. These were a long draft but not as light and springy as Lewknor. I preferred these. I will give Watlington bells 6 ½ out of

Our last tower before lunch was Ewelme, St

Mary. These also had a long draft but were a nice ring of six. At Ewelme we rang some pleasant Grandsire and all in all were very enjoyable. The church, tower and surroundings were also very pleasant with some fascinating and beautiful scenery.

At lunch some of us headed over to the Chequers Inn at Berrick Salome and others headed for the picnic benches in the garden. As I was one of those who had the picnic I have to say the highlight was the trifle that Bob brought along!! Mainly because of the fun we had trying to eat it. Did You Know?

The heaviest ring of bells in the world are the twelve bells of Liverpool Cathedral?

The tenor weighs 82cwt. The bells are also the highest and are hung in a radial frame. Hung in the middle of the circle is Great **George which** weighs a monstrous 295cwt, the second largest bell in the British The tower has its own lift.

The Cathedral is the largest Anglican Cathedral in the world
