Stonesfield and Combe Open Tower Days.

Stonesfield's tower was open as part of various fund-raising events for the restoration of their church roof. Held on Easter Monday it attracted a lot of interest. It was a challenge to climb amongst the bells and then the vertical ladder to the roof but most were determined to reach the top. They were rewarded with spectacular views of the surrounding countryside.

Combe's event, on Saturday 17 June, was to show the village the bells

and how they work with the enticement of getting onto the roof. It started with a quarter-peal to celebrate the Queen's birthday. Display boards, showing various aspects of ringing, had been obtained from the Oxford Guild, helpers were positioned at points in the tower to assist with the climb and home-made cakes and biscuits were provided by the ringers. Those who showed an interest in ringing were given a demonstration of rope handling on a tied bell.

Both events were extremely popular and help to integrate our mysterious art into the wider community.

Next year I shall sit at the

back of the coach, so that I'm well out of sight when Lorna is casting around for a "volunteer" to do the write-up. Anyway, maybe it's a small price to pay for a good day out! The pick-up was a tad early, but the morning weather was fine, so it didn't feel so bad, and once the coach starts to roll who cares anyway. An uneventful journey got us to our first tower of the morning, St Nicholas in Warwick, in very good time. The church is at the edge of a city park, where the café advertised breakfasts, and several of the party moved optimistically in the direction of the arrows. But were disappointed. A stroll round the park, within sight of the fairytale castle, had to suffice until we could get into the tower. The ringing-up moved on to Grandsire Triples which was so well done that it elicited a round of applause from the rest of us! Everyone had ample opportunity to tug a rope at some point and a bit of "Oxford" brought things to a close. Back on the coach, we meandered on through blossom-lined roads and green fields (sorry, all sounds a bit lyrical) until the coach slowed to a crawl, and then stopped. for no apparent reason. The front of the coach was lowered, as though expecting someone to get on, and then proceeded at

a snail's pace. The coach, it seemed had a height of 12'1" and the bridge, which Richard quite naturally, driving a car, hadn't noticed, was only 12'8"! On to Packwood. This was an interesting little church, next to a moated enclosure with one or two rather grand houses, it's a ground floor ring and the bells are rather light which, sadly, resulted in three losing its stay early on. After a bit of a conflab, Richard arrived and. without more ado, performed his Spiderman impression, leaping up towards the rope end, probably 9 or 10 feet above the floor, grabbing it with one hand and then proceeding to bounce up and down, getting increasingly distant above us, until the bell "went over" and he was able to bring it back under control, albeit without the stay! Now I was left wondering: if it had gone over backwards, would he have been extruded through the ring on the guide?? These gymnastics enabled ringing to continue unaffected, though three needed continuous attention. On through country lanes we proceeded to Henleyin-Arden where we had our lunch stop arranged. The food was fine, though the staff and management seemed a bit overwhelmed by our

arrival. The rain also

started while we were

eating. Anyway, after moving off to the tower, we were shortly joined by Richard who reported that the pub claimed that they were £30 short on the bill. This didn't surprise some of us who had had to point out significant errors in their maths to our advantage. A bit later Richard re-appeared to announce that they had waived the shortfall which led to considerable conjecture as to the persuasive techniques employed!! Now replete from our lunch stop, we moved on to Tanworth-in-Arden, an attractive village, with views over the surrounding countryside from the graveyard. The bells, here, sounded really well and I left the tower towards the end to listen outside and take a look at the church. The organ, which dates from the start of the 20thC is very ornate and has pipes on both sides of the Chancel. Was this an early attempt at stereo sound?? Back on the coach, the sweeties were passed around as we sped on to Kings Norton for a final ring on St. Nicholas's ten bells.

Did You Know?

The Rev C W O Jenkyn was the Guilds second Master. From 1899-1910 he was at Witney where he was the spur needed to form a new branch.

In 1902 he brought together the sixty six ringers from the towers of Burford, Ducklington, Freeland, Kidlington, Stanton Harcourt, Witney, Woodstock and Yarnton to form the Witney and Woodstock Branch.

It is interesting to note that two of these towers situated on the edge of the branch have since 'transferred'. Burford is now in The Chipping Norton Branch and Kidlington is in the Oxford City Branch

The Revd Jenkyn was elected Deputy
Guild Master in 1905 and served as Master from 1910 – 1933

Not only was he fine ringer but also a fine oarsman.

In 1933 he attended a meeting at Newbury to ring on the newly augmented ten. Having just rung a touch he went outside to listen. Walking down the street he collapsed and died.
